

DOES YOUR FREIGHT REQUIRE A TANK ENDORSED DRIVER?

Reduce possible delays by determining if your liquid or gas shipments require a tank endorsed driver as outlined by the FMCSA

FMCSA DEFINITION OF A TANK

Any commercial vehicle that is designed to transport any liquid or gaseous material within a tank or tanks having an individual rate capacity of more than 119 gallons

An aggregated capacity of 1,000 gallons or more that is either permanently or temporarily attached to the vehicle or chassis



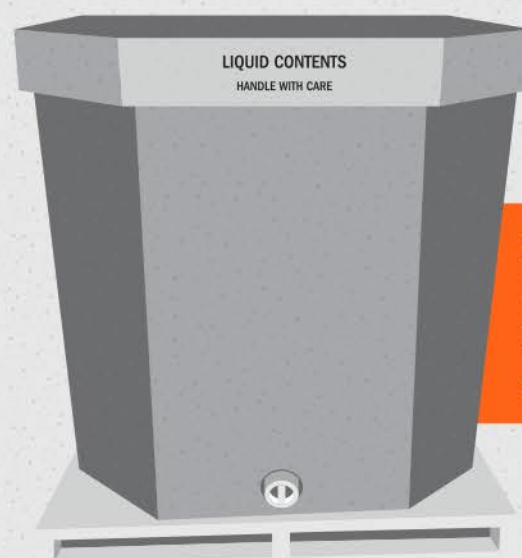
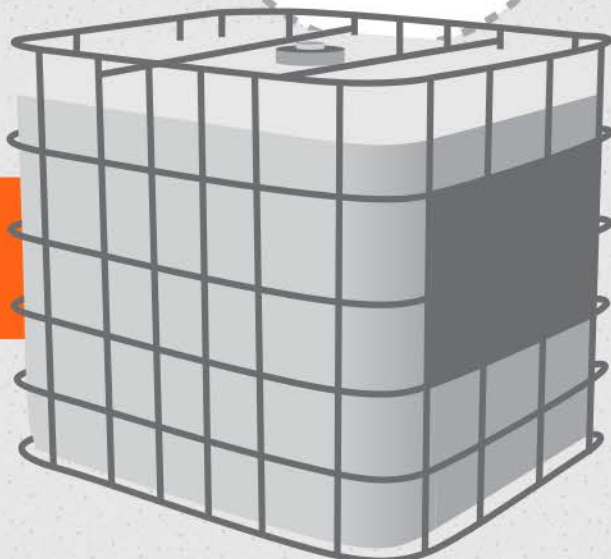
If the load meets the requirements defining a tank AND the tanks exceed 1,000 gallons in total, the load must be transported by a driver with a tank endorsement on his or her CDL

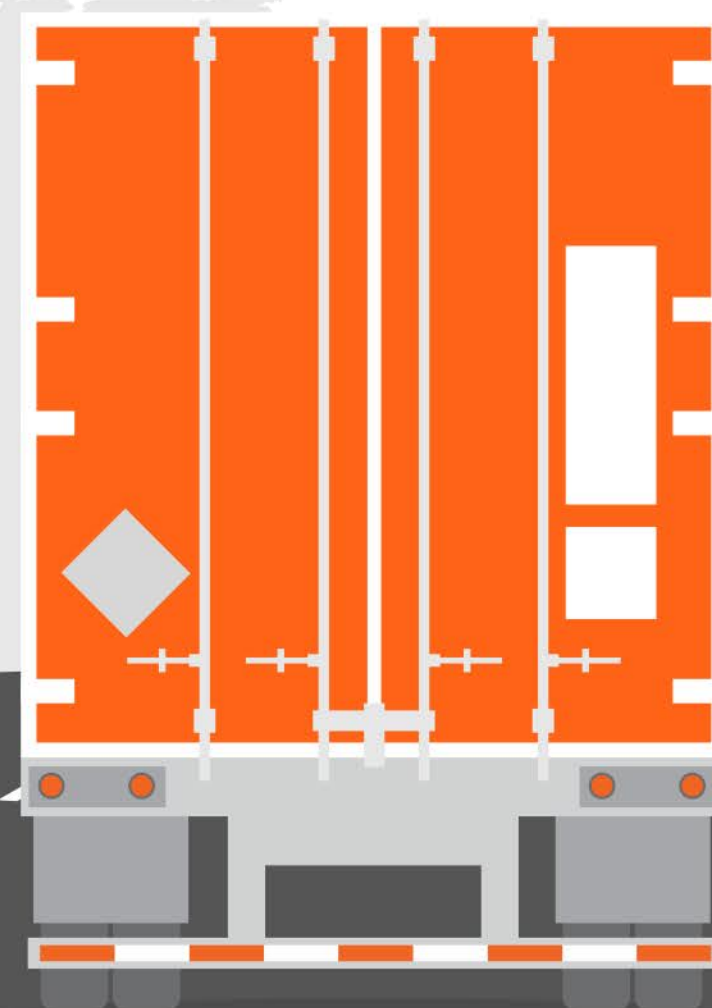
